2023 Recycling Stickers Go On Sale

The New Lebanon Town Clerk's Office will have 2023 recycling permits for sale starting Monday, December 12th, 2022. The fee will remain the same as 2022 (\$100 for non-residents, \$50 for Columbia County residents, and \$35 for residents over the age of 65). You will receive 2 stickers to utilize on two different vehicles. You must have a recycling sticker to drop recyclables at any Columbia County Solid Waste Department Stations, including the one in New Lebanon. You can drop recyclables at any of the stations in Columbia County with these stickers.

The General Election is Tuesday, November 8, 2022 at the Immaculate Conception Church, 732 US Route 20. The polls are open from 6am – 9pm. On the ballot this election are the offices of: Governor, Lt. Gov., Comptroller, Atty. General, US Senator, State Sup. Court Justice, Rep. in Congress, State Senator, Mem. Of Assembly, Cty. Clerk & Cty. Coroner.

Hunting Licenses – From the Town Clerk

The New Lebanon Town Clerk's Office would like to remind everyone that Hunting Season is upon us! You do not have to be a New Lebanon resident for this service, anyone from anywhere can purchase a NY State Hunting/Fishing License through my office with the appropriate documentation. My office is open Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday from 9:00am-5:00pm. As in years past we are offering extended hours on Fridays from 9:00am-7:00pm with the remaining Fridays left: November 4th and November 18th.

Deer Management Permits (DMP) went on sale at the start of this year's selling season, in August through close of business on October 1st, 2022. If there are any leftover DMPs, they will be available on a first-come, first-served basis on or about November 1st. You can go on the DEC website or contact my office to see what units are leftover.

Whether you are an avid hunter or a beginner, here are some precautions to keep in mind!

- *Treat every firearm as if it were loaded and only point at what you plan to shoot;
- *Before Shooting, clearly identify your target and what's beyond it;
- *Plan for the weather. Dress in warm layers;
- *Alert someone of your plans and
- *Wear bright orange clothing. You'll be camouflaged from your game, but visible to other hunters!

Please remember that these bills are mailed out by January 1st each year and to be on the lookout for it in the mail. News From The Assessor's Office

Exemptions-

As a reminder Enhanced STAR RENEWALS are handled by the Department of Taxation and Finance. There is no need to renew with the Assessor. If you receive a letter from the Department of Taxation and Finance you must respond to them directly.

If you are turning 65 by the end of 2023 and ALREADY have Basic STAR, you may be eligible for Enhanced STAR if your income is below \$93,200. These applications are due to the Assessor prior to March 1, 2023. If you fit these criteria but do NOT currently have STAR you would NOT apply with the Assessor. Instead, you would register with the State at www.tax.ny.gov. Please see the Assessors Page of the New Lebanon website for more information and links.

All other exemption renewals will be sent around the first week in December. This includes Low-income Seniors, Low income Disabled and Agricultural renewals.

The income limit for the Low-income exemptions is currently \$37,400. This is your GROSS Income, not your Taxable income. If you feel you are eligible, you can find the exemption forms on the Assessors page of the Town's website. You may also call to request a form be sent to you.

Reassessment –

The Assessor is working with the contractor to set up the 2023 preliminary values. These values will be based on sales information through July 1, 2022. Preliminary values will be mailed to each parcel owner around March 1, 2023.

Need Help Heating Your Home This Winter

As we all know, costs are rising on everything! The Town of New Lebanon is collaborating with Charlie's Pantry, Unity Lodge No. 9, The American Legion, Larabee Fuel, and HL Fuel to help assist residents in heating their homes. HEAP Is Now Open for Enrollment

The Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) for the 2022-23 season is now accepting applications. You can pick up an application at the New Lebanon Town Clerk's Office. If you received a regular benefit last year and are over 60 years old, you should have already received your application. If you are receiving food stamps, you are automatically enrolled in HEAP.

If you would like to apply for HEAP and did not receive it last year, you must have an interview and may opt for an in person or phone interview. To qualify for HEAP, you must make under \$2,852 per month gross for a household of 1, under \$3,730 per month gross for a household of 2, under \$4,608 per month gross for a household of 3, under \$5,485 per month gross for a household of 4 and under \$6,363 for a household of 5. New applicants must have proof of each household member's identity, proof of applicant's social security number and for each household member, proof of residence, proof of fuel and/or utility bill if you pay for heat or proof that you pay rent which includes heat, and proof of income for all household members. If you need assistance applying you can contact Columbia Opportunities (if under 60 years old) at 518-828-4611 or Office for the Aging (if over 60 years old) at 518-828-4258. You can also contact the Department of Social Services at 518-828-9411 with any questions. You can also apply online at www.mybenefits.ny.gov. For more information about HEAP go to: <http://www.ny.gov/services/apply-heap>.

If you are eligible for HEAP, you may also be eligible for the Columbia Opportunities Inc. Weatherization Program. COI provides energy audits to eligible homeowners and renters to find the best way to make their homes more energy efficient. Weatherization measures - such as furnace repair or replacement, wall and attic insulation, air sealing, energy efficient refrigerators - are installed to make residences safe, comfortable and less expensive to heat. Most people see a 20% reduction in their home heating bills after the weatherization work is done! Please call 518-828-4611 or 518-672-7268 for more information and an application. Charlie's Pantry offers free food and household supplies to New Lebanon residents. We are located at the Immaculate Conception Church at 732 Route 20. Our current hours are every Saturday 10:30am - 1:00pm. We also have our sign-up sheet out for Thanksgiving Dinner basket. We can make appointments for emergencies or if a family occasionally runs out of food and cannot come when we are open.

Sign-up sheets for the holidays are at the pantry for dinner (plus extras) to prepare for each holiday. Thanksgiving sign up deadline is: November 12th and Christmas dinner sign up deadline is: December 17th. Additionally, we have a giving tree for families with children aged 16 and younger. Please give us the children's age, gender, size and interests before December 17th and gifts will be bought and wrapped for them for Christmas.

Fall and Winter Safety Reminders

Cooler temperatures are a reminder of fun fall activities and family gatherings for the holidays. However, the fall and winter months also call for extra precautions. The NYS Division of Consumer Protection, in partnership with the Consumer Protection Safety Commission (CPSC), offers these tips to keep you safe.

The CPSC reports that house fires led to an average of over 2,300 deaths, over 10,000 injuries, and \$7B in property damage from 2016-2018. Home fires are common, but also preventable. Carbon monoxide associated with generators and home heating systems accounted for the largest percentage of reported fatalities; there were 808 deaths from 2004 through 2013 due to carbon monoxide poisoning. We urge you to take preventative measures to reduce the risk and protect yourselves, your families, and your community:

Fire and Carbon Monoxide Safety Tips:

- **Make sure your smoke alarm and carbon monoxide alarms are functioning by testing them once per month.** Both alarms should be battery-operated or have a battery back-up, and batteries should be changed once per year. You should have a *separate* alarm for each to prevent these separate emergencies.
- **Have a smoke alarm and carbon monoxide alarm on every floor, outside sleeping areas and inside bedrooms.** You can check for interconnecting alarms so that one sounds, they all sound.
- **Your smoke alarm doesn't just sound when there is a fire.** Learn the difference between the sounds: **three loud beeps (continuous)** means there is smoke or a fire, and **one "chirp" every 30-60 seconds** means it is time to change the battery.
- **Your smoke alarm must be changed every 10 years.** Make sure you find out how old the smoke alarm is when you move into a new residence. If your smoke alarm continues to "chirp" even after you have replaced the battery, it's time to replace your smoke alarm.
- **Most home fires start in the kitchen.** Make sure you always keep watch over your cooking and that there is a fire extinguisher nearby.
- **Have a fire escape plan and review it with your family.** Make sure plans meet the needs of those with disabilities, children, and those with mobility issues in the household.
- **Know the symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning: headache, dizziness, weakness, nausea, vomiting, sleepiness, and confusion.** If you suspect CO poisoning, get outside to fresh air immediately, and then call 911.
- **On average, one of every 13 hotel or motel reports a structure fire each year.** Make sure you are staying at a hotel or motel equipped with smoke alarms and sprinklers, locate the fire exits when you arrive, and review the escape plan with your traveling companions.
- **Have your home heating systems (including chimneys and vents) inspected and serviced annually by a trained service technician.**
- **Never use portable generators inside homes or garages, even if doors and windows are open.** Use generators outside only, at least 20 feet away from your home.

From The Business & Economic Development Committee

The Business and Economic Development Committee (BEDC) continues to support the Town's businesses through these ever-shifting times.

The Town Board designated a portion of the funds received from the American Recovery Plan Act (ARPA) for businesses who suffered losses due to the Covid pandemic. BEDC members have been interviewing our businesses and soliciting applications for funding (these are direct grants). Several applications are now under consideration.

The BEDC has worked with the Supervisor, the Town Board, and several volunteers on two major grant requests for revitalizing our downtown business community environment: the Mainstreet program, and New York Forward. BEDC is grateful to Bob Gilson, who took the lead in drafting the New York Forward proposal and shepherding it through numerous revisions. If granted, these proposals will help create a more attractive "look and feel" to our business corridor along Routes 20/22, promote a walkable downtown, provide for renovation and/or new construction of mixed-use retail/housing structures, and help create a Community Center for Town residents.

Our work on infrastructure for Town businesses continues with a search for funding for a feasibility study of wastewater disposal along the main business corridor. We are pleased to note the decision of Filli's Deli and Bakery to purchase the Tilden Plaza for a full-featured grocery store and deli, which will benefit all of us and, we hope, induce more travelers to stop off and do business here.

The BEDC has established close working relationships with the Columbia County Economic Development Corporation and is working with them on several fronts, including specific assistance to businesses here in New Lebanon.

Preparing for Winter

It is important to prepare for the impending cold and snow. Listed below are some ideas to help you deal with the demands of winter weather:

***Maintain a supply of non-perishable food & bottled water to last several days in case you lose power or can't get to a store
***Keep a non-slip mat inside the entrance door to your home to prevent slipping on snow/water that may drip from your boots upon entering
***Keep rain gutters clear of leaves to prevent overflowing of water which can cause damage to your home & ice build-up on walk ways
***Keep sidewalks clear of snow and spread salt to prevent ice build-up
***Wear layered, loose fitting clothing to stay warm, indoors and out
***Pack a flashlight, back-up batteries, radio and warm blanket in your car in case you get stuck
***Install snow tires and top off winter windshield solution to melt ice
***Keep your cell phone charged
***Remember to drink water as it is just as important to stay hydrated during the cold winter

Climate Smart Communities Task Force

Though summer, 2022, was the second hottest one in North America since recording began in 1880, most residents in our corner of the planet were able to savor the usual pleasures of the season.

Members of the Climate Smart Communities Task Force continued to pursue ways to preserve and protect New Lebanon’s way of life despite the changes taking place throughout the planet.

Cathy Wilkerson and Kristine Cottom began attending Sustainable Food Management classes sponsored by the Department of Environmental Conservation. They will learn how to create a feasible method of collecting and composting food scraps from all town residents. Composting has already begun in a small way with volunteers collecting coffee grounds from local restaurants and providing baskets for food scraps outside the Farmers’ Market.

The town received a \$5000 grant as a result of the Task Force’s work in recruiting residents to purchase electric heat pumps. The completion of this campaign bumped New Lebanon up to 4000 points in NYSEERDA’s Clean Energy Communities (CEC) program which entitles us to a \$20,000 grant. The money will go toward installing 5 heat pumps in Town Hall. New Lebanon is now a regional leader in CEC program. By the end of the year, we hope to get to 5000 points which will entitle us to a \$70,000 grant for energy upgrades in town buildings. The Task Force is now embarking on a campaign advocating electric cars.



In compliance with the Town’s Comprehensive Plan, four additional bike racks have been purchased and will be installed — two in Shatford Park, one at Town Hall, and one in Midtown Mall.

Adelia Moore and Bruce Shenker helped with another Repair Café in East Nassau in September. People who owned broken items were matched with people who could fix them.

Volunteers gave 91 hours over the summer to keep the new trees in Shatford Park watered. These trees will provide a stream-side buffer that will help decrease erosion and reduce flooding.

New Lebanon's Climate Smart Task Force was asked to give a presentation at the "Locally Sourced: Municipal Green Policy Solutions" conference in Syracuse. CSC Chair, Steve Powers represented New

Lebanon and was joined by Cornell Professor Rebecca Morgenstern Brenner to highlight our successful CSC efforts. CSC advisor Marc Anthonisen who helped New Lebanon achieve Bronze in record time was also in attendance. Powers took the opportunity to speak to DEC Commissioner, Basil Seggos about issues of concern in New Lebanon.

Other task force members continued to collect used clothing, old bikes, and batteries for reuse or proper disposal. Because there is such a variety of ways to reduce waste, everyone on the Task Force is able to find an area that interests them. We are updating our list of residents over the age of 55 with name, address, phone number and email address in order to notify you of programs available to you and to be able to check on you in an emergency. Please email Sarah or call at the above number if you would like your name added to our list.

The State, County and Town offer programs to us to assist in maintaining our health, independence and home. Columbia County has the third oldest population in the State of New York with the numbers rising every year. We are a rural community with limited public transportation and many of our residents do not drive. We have programs to assist you to get services, groceries and to appointments as well as services which come to you. This section of the newsletter will provide you information about those programs and how to participate.

This time I will highlight some programs whose enrollment is coming up and you may be interested in.

HEAP, STAR and FOOD DISTRIBUTION: These are programs available to our seniors. See sections of this newsletter for more information. Contact any of your reps above for assistance applying.

VOTING: If you need a ride to vote call one of your reps above and we will arrange for you to get to the Church of Immaculate Conception to vote. This is the only polling place in New Lebanon.

MEALS ON WHEELS: With winter weather coming and your garden asleep do you need a way to get a nutritious meal once a day and would you like it to be delivered? Are you over the age of 60 and homebound and find it hard to prepare a meal? If you are please contact 518-828-4258 and ask to be set up for meal delivery. Meals are provided Monday through Friday and a meal to set up for yourself on Sat and Sun. The meals are delivered to you by neighbors who have signed up to deliver. They usually come between 11 and 12:30 pm the driver will tell you about snow days and what to do. This program is available year-round.

All of the representatives for the Office for the Aging, the Town Board of New Lebanon and its residents are here to provide support for any of our seniors who need it. We offer many services that are tailored to the needs of our seniors which are meant to help keep you safe, healthy, and happy. We provide you with peace of mind by offering daily in-home security calls from the Columbia County Sheriff Department and meals on wheels. Seasonally, we offer double the amount of farmers' market coupons for fresh, local fruits and vegetables. On the other hand, we offer home weatherization and support through the Home Energy Assistance Program to keep you warm during our Northeast winters. These are just a few key services that we at the Office for the Aging provide for our beloved seniors.
