The Highway Department is Hiring!

The Highway Department is looking for experienced equipment operators with a valid CDL-B. If interested, applications for employment can be picked up in the Town Clerk's Office.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT HEAVY EQUIPMENT OPERATOR / LABORER

JOB SUMMARY

Performs a variety of heavy skilled and unskilled manual work in the construction, repair, snow removal, and maintenance of Town roads, culverts, and other public works projects. Exercises some judgment and resourcefulness in applying maintenance methods and correcting hazardous road conditions. Safely and efficiently operate vehicles and light and heavy construction equipment.

EXAMPLES OF ESSENTIAL DUTIES (The listed examples are illustrative only and may not include all duties found in this position.)

1. Routinely performs various tasks essential to public works operations, including digging trenches, laying asphalt, patching pot holes, cutting and chipping brush and tree limbs, laying pipe, repairing, replacing, and cleaning storm drains, sweeping roads, picking up litter along roadsides, and other duties associated with maintaining and reconstructing roads.
2. Operate heavy equipment involved in highway maintenance and construction projects, including backhoe, loader, bull dozer, excavator, snow plow and wing, and salting/sanding truck.
3. Available to meet emergency situations during Winter weather; plows and hauls snow, and spreads salt and sand and shovels snow.
4. Operates light equipment necessary to maintain and repair Town roads and properties, including snow blower, lawn mowers, weed whacker, chipper, chain saw, and other hand and power equipment.
5. Performs a number of duties as directed by the Public Works Director or other supervisor in support of overall municipal operations.
6. Washes and maintains appearance of Highway Department equipment and vehicles as needed. Performs other related duties as required.

MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS REQUIRED

Possession of a valid CDL-B. Some prior experience working for a highway department preferred. Possession of sufficient physical ability to perform the required tasks; OR any combination of education and experience which demonstrates the possession of the required knowledge, skills, and abilities; AND willingness to be on call to meet emergency situations and to work outdoors under extreme weather conditions.

KNOWLEDGE, SKILLS, AND ABILITIES REQUIRED

Knowledge of the methods, materials, tools, and equipment used on highway maintenance and public works projects; knowledge of the work hazards, safety practices, and traffic laws relating to construction equipment operation. Some knowledge of State laws and regulations pertaining to motor vehicle operations. Ability to learn the basic duties in road maintenance and construction; ability to operate construction equipment and tools used for highway maintenance and construction work; ability to use simple hand and power tools; ability to learn to operate and maintain heavy-duty construction and road maintenance equipment, including a backhoe, loader, bull dozer, snow plow and wing, and

salting/sanding truck, and other similar heavy construction equipment; ability to perform simple and routine manual labor; ability to perform frequent strenuous physical effort under adverse weather conditions; ability to follow State and local laws, rules, regulations, and policies and procedures; ability to detect errors in equipment operations; ability to understand and follow oral and written instructions; ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships with supervisor and coworkers, Town officials and employees, contractors, and the public; ability to be on call 24 hours a day.

MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS REQUIRED

Possession of a valid CDL-B. Some prior experience working for a highway department preferred. Possession of sufficient physical ability to perform the required tasks; OR any combination of education and experience which demonstrates the possession of the required knowledge, skills, and abilities; AND willingness to be on call to meet emergency situations and to work outdoors under extreme weather conditions.

PHYSICAL EXERTION/ENVIRONMENTAL CONDITIONS (The physical demands described here are representative of those that must be met by an employee to successfully perform the essential functions of this job.)

For communicating with others, talking is required; for taking instructions from others, hearing is required; for doing the job effectively and correctly, sight is required; and for detecting unusual odors that indicate the presence of harmful exhaust and gas fumes, the incorrect operation of equipment, etc., smelling is required. Required to use hands to finger, handle, and feel objects, tools, or controls; required to reach with hands and arms. Strenuous physical effort demanded in heavy lifting and carrying (up to 75 lbs.) and in performing work. Regularly works outdoors under hazardous road conditions, in varying and extreme weather conditions with exposure to excessive noise, noxious fumes and gases, toxins, paints, caustic chemicals, fuels, lubricants, solvents, and other fluids, as well as dirt, dust, grease, household garbage, and other disagreeable materials; physical demands include traversing rough terrain and climbing in and out of culverts, ditches, and heavy machinery and standing and walking on rough, wet, slippery surfaces, including dirt, asphalt, and concrete. Exposure to continuous noises and minor injuries such as cuts and bruises; exposure to long periods of sunlight; poisonous plants, and insects and bees.

The State, County and Town offer programs to us to assist in maintaining our health, independence and home. Columbia County has the third oldest population in the State of New York with the numbers rising every year. We are a rural community with limited public transportation and many of our residents do not drive. We have programs to assist you to get services, groceries and to appointments as well as services which come to you. This section of the newsletter will provide you information about those programs and how to participate. Here are some programs you may be interested in:

HEAP, STAR and FOOD DISTRIBUTION: These are programs available to our seniors. See sections of this newsletter for more information. Contact any of your reps above for assistance applying.

MEALS ON WHEELS: Are you over the age of 60 and homebound and find it hard to prepare a meal? If you are please contact 518-828-4258 and ask to be set up for meal delivery. Meals are provided Monday through Friday and a meal to set up for yourself on Sat and Sun. The meals are delivered to you by neighbors who have signed up to deliver. They usually come between 11 and 12:30 pm the driver will tell you about snow days and what to do. This program is available year-round.

All of the representatives for the Office for the Aging, the town board of New Lebanon and its residents are here to provide support for any of our seniors who need it. We offer many services that are tailored to the needs of our seniors which are meant to help keep you safe, healthy, and happy. We provide you with peace of mind by offering daily in-home security calls from the Columbia County Sheriff Department. Seasonally, we offer double the amount of farmers' market coupons for fresh, local fruits and vegetables. On the other hand, we offer home weatherization and support through the Home Energy Assistance Program to keep you warm during our northeast winters.

From The Town Historian

Cypress Hill Project

With Phase One of the Cypress Hill project completed, the coordinating group met to discuss the next phase of work. Due to an illness, the original headstone restorer is unable to continue. Joe Ferrannini of Grave Stone Matters out of Hoosick Falls will take over the restoration. Mr. Ferrannini will start work the first part of October 2025 and will be providing instruction on the proper method of cleaning headstones. The treasurer for the Lebanon Valley Community Corporation, the holder of the grant money, submitted a mid-point report to the National Society of the DAR. Included in the report was the change of restorer and a request to extend the grant time line, which was approved to October 31, 2025.

The generous donations to the Cypress Hill restoration and preservation project will be used to keep the cemetery space safe from falling tree limbs and debris. The superintendent of the Cemetery of the Evergreens, Ed Godfroy, spoke on the need to remove some trees and the group approved the removal of those trees that would cause damage to stones or are dead.

Other topics discussed were replacement stones for graves with unreadable or missing stones; potential for a DAR sign commemorating the Revolutionary soldiers buried in Cypress Hill; and information signage identifying the soldiers buried in Cypress Hill and background information on their units and service.

The Visit of the Marquis de Lafayette to Lebanon Springs



June 13, 2025 will mark the 200th anniversary of the visit of the Marquis de Lafayette and his son to Lebanon Springs. The Marquis was invited by the Congress of the United States to help commemorate the 50th anniversary of the American Revolution. Lafayette arrived in the United States in 1824 and commenced a two-year tour of our country. In June of 1825, Lafayette journeyed from Albany, NY to be met by military men and citizens of New Lebanon at the border with Rensselaer County and escorted to Columbia Hall for a gala celebration. While here, Lafayette was shown the Springs, was wined and dined, signed the guest book, and departed. He was escorted to the Massachusetts line where he was met by Pittsfield officials to continue his journey.

There will be a dedication ceremony at the Lafayette marker in June. The date and time for the event will be published in Grow the Valley and on the town website.

A Message from the Assessor

Recently, I have received a number of calls from residents about mailings from tax abatement companies. These companies send bulk mailings to communities all across New York State and will accept any case regardless of its location or merit. Due to their lack of knowledge of our area, and the sheer volume of work they handle, the quality of information used in the grievance process is minimal at best. This practice not only strains local resources but also costs our small-town tax dollars to defend cases that have no merit.

Please note that this is strictly a for-profit business focused on its profits, not your property value.

While you are welcome to use their services, we strongly encourage you to speak with your assessor instead. If your property is genuinely overvalued, your chances of a reduction are much greater, and you would not have to give half of the savings to a company.

The Tentative Roll will be published on May 1st. If you have any questions about your assessment, now is the time to contact the Assessor's Office. Grievance Day will be May 28, 2025 from 4:00PM-8:00PM. Detailed information and forms can be found on our website.

News from the NL Climate Smart Task Force (CSC)

The heat pumps, solar panels and battery backups at the Community Center have been installed and we are waiting for NYSEG to schedule a date when they will turn off the electricity so that the panels can be connected to the grid. NYSERDA has reimbursed the town for the first stage and the final payment will be coming soon.

News from the NL Climate Smart Task Force (CSC) (Continued)

The CSC annual **Roadside Cleanup** was held on April 26th. Starting at Shatford Park volunteers cleaned sections of the Wyomanock Creek accessible from the park. Other teams cleaned Rte. 20 which always seems to be the most trashed road in town. Thanks to all who came out to clean and thanks to our friends at Mavericks for graciously donating refreshments for our cleaners. New Lebanon is a little bit cleaner because of the efforts of our own concerned residents.

A Repair Café will be held in New Lebanon at the Community Center on May 10 from 10am-2pm and for the New Lebanon Seniors June 20 at the Community Center.

Our bike team is planning a repair tune-up on May 17 at Shatford Park from 10am-2pm. They will also be holding them on the following dates from 3:30pm – 5pm at the Community Center: June 19, July 17, Aug 21, Sept 18 and Oct 16th. We encourage residents to bring their bikes for a checkup.

Thanks to the Climate Smart Communities initiative, a Cornell study and state funding, the LVPA's need for a reliable water supply was identified and addressed.

In 2020, the New Lebanon Town Board resolved to join Climate Smart Communities (CSC), a statewide effort of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation aimed to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and improve climate resilience. A task force was created and got to work exploring ways for New Lebanon to reduce its carbon emissions and adapt to the changing climate. In the ensuing years, the task force, chaired by Steve Powers, completed tasks that earned points and made the town, despite its small size, the first in Columbia County to receive Bronze, and then Silver status in the CSC program. Among the tasks, which included projects such as battery and plastic recycling, kitchen scrap collections, and electric vehicle and heat pump campaigns, was a Climate Vulnerability Study.

When Cornell Grad students, Jessie Hughes and Waqar Ahktar, undertook this study, they interviewed LVPA Fire Chief Steve Houghtling and found that fire trucks were being supplied by water from local ponds. The students recommended that the CSC seek out funding for a water tank that would alleviate the stress in dry periods. Another Cornell student, Nadia Zaidi, researched tank options. CSC members approached Assembly member Didi Barrett, who graciously offered one of her state-allotted grants of \$125,000 for worthy projects such as this. Thanks to this combined effort, Lebanon Valley residents are now safer in case of fire.

"We thank Assemblywoman Didi Barrett for arranging this grant for the LVPA and Town residents. The drought conditions and resulting fires that we experienced last fall reinforced the need for a reliable source of water during dry periods," said Fire Chief, Steve Houghtling. "This is a textbook example of how collaboration can yield results that will potentially benefit all residents. We are happy to have had this opportunity," adds Powers. Asked why she chose to help fund this project, Barrett said, "I was pleased to secure this water tank funding for the Lebanon Valley Protective Association to ensure that our first responders always have a reliable source of

water. Supporting our heroic volunteer firefighters, especially in rural areas where resources are sometimes scarce, is always a priority.”

Update from the New Lebanon Conservation Advisory Council (CAC)

Drinking Water Source Protection Plan (DWSP2) - The CAC restarted testing for 2025. Testing is 100% voluntary by residents. We are interested in information on anything concerning residents, like things that have been buried or dumped uphill/upstream from their wells. Please reach out to nlcac.munves@gmail.com to get on the water testing list

Joint BEDC and Conservation Advisory Council Wastewater Feasibility Study - The joint BEDC and CAC committee on Wastewater and Muni water sent out surveys to a few dozen businesses and residences along Rte. 20-22 and side streets. This is for important information gathering for all property owners and renters to assess more in depth concerns on water issues and septic issues along the business corridor. For the study, Lamont Engineers will calibrate water test results along the business corridor to get a better picture of water quality and concerns. They engineers have been perc testing in a variety of places as well for the feasibility study that is in progress.

Trees for Tribs - CAC volunteers and the Town Board Park Liaison Joanne Amlaw are looking for more folks to help in the park this year with watering and staking. We are working with Town Board Member Joanne Amlaw who brought Tree specialist Joe Dwileski to look at the park and make recommendations for replanting many of the plants as well as ongoing maintenance and staking. Based on Joe's recommendations, we are putting together a proposal for the Town Board that we all believe will make the park look more beautiful and welcoming and make residents happier with the project.

HVAHC Pilot Project - The CAC is very excited to be working with all of the principals on this project. It is such a benefit to have conservation needs at the top most of any housing project/s and we look forward to see what develops. There has been some misinformation on social media about this project and there will NEVER be any land that is in conservation that will be used for building housing.

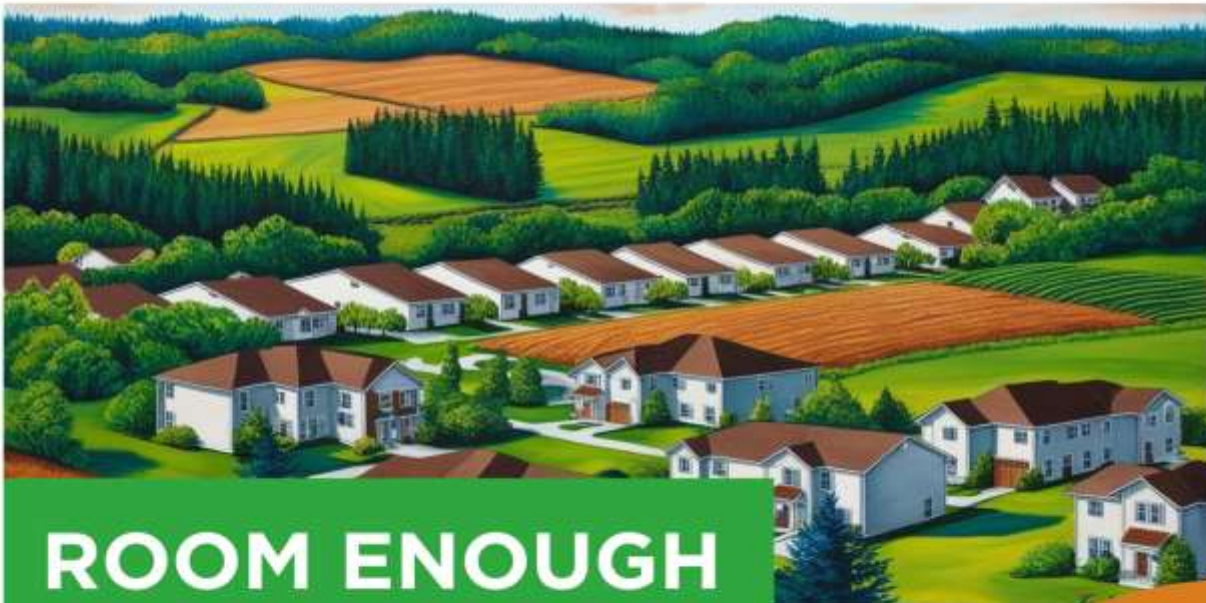
